

On most Wednesdays after bible study he would take Grace home and come back so we could sell donuts & coffee for the church at market until 1:00 pm. Thursday we went to 12:00 pm bible study taught by a lay leader. Joyce went to choir practice at 5:30. Friday 9:30 – 11:30 we went to F.A.S.T. (foothills area social time) at the church. Where we played Hand and Foot, Mexican Train or Pinochle. Everyone brought goodies to go with coffee and tea. Often a group of us would go out to dinner about 4 to beat the crowd.

Saturday afternoon was off to Walmart to get Joyce's hair done.

Sunday we left the house at 7:20 so Joyce could be in choir by 7:30 She sang in both services. From 6:00—8:00 pm, Ed and Joyce went to a home where several couples gathered for homemade ice cream & banana sundaes.

We helped serve two meals during Thanksgiving, also two meals at Christmas for Crossroads Mission in down town Yuma which is i4 miles west of where we live. There were 2 serving lines for each meal. Just over 400 went through our line at each meal. All of this took place outside in the "sunshine" Ed played pinochle on Mon. evenings

Also went shopping in Mexico several times. Just some of the things we did.
