



FROM THE PASTOR

Wednesday March 1 is the beginning of Lent. This is the time of year we focus on our own spiritual journey. This is the time to look inward and review where we are with God and explore ways to strengthen our spirituality. This is a time to talk with God but importantly listen to God.

I grew up in a neighborhood where a majority of my friends were Catholic. They were verbal about their tradition of "giving up" something for Lent. This usually meant sweets, desserts etc. I have a different perspective of the discipline of giving up. What would happen if we looked at what is keeping us from being close to God--roadblocks. What would happen if our Lenten journey was about giving up the roadblocks? Roadblocks are put there by us, not God. If a person says "I do not feel close to God anymore." The appropriate response is "oh, who moved?"

Here are some suggestions of what a person may consider as options to "give up": Unnecessary anger, gossip, blaming others, avoiding problems, feeling sorry for ourselves, fear, anxiety, resentment, years of guilt, disappointment, unrealistic expectation, running from reality, shutting down, refusing to be open with our family and friends, excuses----well, the list goes on depending on each person.

Let us commit to using this time to create a deeper, more personal, honest and concrete relationship with the God who loves us unconditionally and never gives up on us. Blessings for a rewarding Lenten journey.
