A NOTE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

As the year draws to a close there are many things I need to say to you. The first and most important is I need you to know how proud I am of each of you. Second I need to update you on how our search is going for a new pastor. Third what do I see for the future of the church and lastly is how scary this all seems, at least to me.

I write this after we, the church, did a memorial service for the family of Evelyn Robinson. Some of us baked using Evelyn's recipes, some of us took care of setting up the audio and video equipment, and some of us provided music. We all pitched in to make it a wonderful celebration, and the family saw that. The church deserves the praise, well done. We are so few in numbers, but each week you make me proud.

Each Sunday someone will ask me about our search for a new pastor, and each week I change the subject. I can say we are nearing a crossroad, putting our faith in the Lord and seeing what doors may open. I can say by the first of the year our goal is to have a new leader for this congregation.

So what does my future of the church look like? We may all see the future with different eyes and visions. My future vision includes retaining what we do so well while opening ourselves to change as I believe that is paramount to survival:

*Embrace what is important to the church today. This includes music, food, and fellowship.

*Continuing the bond we currently are blessed with, the love we feel for each other.

Lastly, let me talk about scary.

We have been very blessed by the pastors who have filled in on Sunday. They have kept us afloat, but without our own pastor we are only treading water. It is not all bad but I am not a good swimmer. I'm challenged to swim across a pool, and if I get to the other side I'm exhausted. I'm scared of treading water.

When we started our search for a new pastor, we went into it wanting to find that perfect match. What we found out very soon was that we were very gun shy. Maybe like that divorced person who still remembers the pain of that failure. Remembering the pain and not wanting to feel that way again. So afraid of more hurt that they focus on people's faults, not their good characteristics. We found that when looking at ministerial profiles we spent more time finding fault with people than looking at the good they had to offer. That made me anxious and scared.

As we have continued with the search process, my fears have changed. I believe God has opened my eyes and shown me that I need to have faith and move forward. I fear we look to a Pastor to come in and fix it all. I believe we are the church, not the Pastor. A Pastor is God's gift to us to help guide us though His work. They all have strengths, they all have weaknesses. I pray that we all put faith in God to embrace the person *he brings to us for what strengths they bring, and* not compare them to that "10" we dream of. Psalm 23 says "Yea though I walk through the valley of death, I will fear no evil, for Thou art with me." That takes faith, and I ask all of you to join me in this journey, even when it's scary.

The Frees in Mozambique

One of the phrases that Erik and I learned when we moved to Mozambique was "Pouco Pouco". You have to say it fast and in a singsong voice to get the meaning across. When we are asked how work is going here in Mozambique, I really want to say "pouco pouco" or slowly and steadily we are progressing. The end of September brought about the start of the new agriculture program and as



we wait to implement phase two, we are back in Beira working on our transportation issues and a few other church projects. Erik is hoping to continue his work fixing some of the pastor's motorcycles and in the process, teaching them basic motorcycle maintenance and repair. I have been visiting a group of widows from our community who were able to begin a sewing program that is providing them with supplementary income for their families. In the past, many churches have tried to start similar sewing programs and for many different reasons, they broke down be-

> fore reaching their goals of sustainability. This group is different and their plan to start small and reach for sustainable goals has made their project successful, even in these early stages. Their first project was making journal covers and then selling them. As their sewing skills improve, they will start making more complicated projects, keeping in mind where there market is. Doing their research paid off and right



away the women were getting offers for their journal covers. In fact, they received so many orders that their first project will create

enough profit that the women will be able to buy their own sewing machines when it is completed. Soon they will begin sewing tote/grocery bags as they graduate to the next level and a new group of widows can be added. Right now the group is small as the church only has 2 hand-crank sewing machines. The women are very excited because soon they will buy more machines, and more women will be able to join their group. Our supporting church partners in the Oregon/Idaho region have purchased some of these journal covers in order to sell them and raise money for the Goi Goi agriculture project.

We ask you to continue to pray for the political climate to return to normal here in Mozambique as the two main parties are still in conflict with each other and further discussions between them have halted. Goi Goi is in an area that is greatly divided along political lines and violence can escalate quickly. Faithfully,
